




# Dick Dee's engine progress









The progress on Dick Dee's engine is coming along. All the sheet metal has been removed and is being cleaned and sandblasted. Then comes a coat of paint. The heads have been deflashed and new O-Rings have been installed. A few busted bolts have to be drilled out and repaired, and then more cleaning and start the re-assembly. As soon as the parts order from Clarks arrives we can start the re-sealing of the engine. The engine was a mess on the outside, but the inside looked great. With any luck it should run fine. But after sitting with no spark plugs installed, you can't be sure of anything. One head show's signs that it has been removed so anything is possible. All we can do is cross our fingers. # 1964 Corvair—Most Improved of Early Models.

Changes for the 1964 Corvair are many and make this year the best of all Early Models. Manual Transmissions were revised with stronger syncros, closer gear ratios, and input shaft strengthened. Handling was improved in many areas. A front stabilizer bar was standard on all models. Rear suspension changes included a rear traverse leaf spring with reduced coil spring rates which gives inproved stability, and ride control. Longer crankshaft stroke increased engine displacement to 164 Cubic Inches. Valves were improved and larger diameter valve springs were used. Pistons were revised for the longer stroke. Camshafts were revised to clear crankshaft and connecting rods, which were of the stronger Spyder type. Oil coolers were also changed, using the 8 and 12 plate types. Air cleaners were changed to a centrally located paper type filter. Clutch changes were also made to accommodate the larger engine. The improved handling and the increased engine displacement are the more noticeable improvements that stand out.

What should you do to put your Pride and joy on display? Of course you will have it cleaned and shined to look it's best, but there is more that you can do. An attractive sign giving information on your particular vehicle will greatly help in drawing attention to your Corvair. You can list the year, make, model and other various details, including Horsepower, transmission type, various options, modifications, if any other points of interest. Another easy descriptive sign can be made of dealer pamphlets.


Signs in about the 2 x 3 foot size, self supporting, seem to be about what most owners find to be their ideal. These can either be homemade or professionally done. The size fits easily into the trunk of your Corvair.

Other items that make showing your Corvair more pleasant include lawn chairs, shade umbrella, snacks, and a beverage cooler.
